Supplies For This Project:

Dresser with Removable Drawers

New Knobs (optional)

Sherwin-Williams Emerald Interior Acrylic Latex

Paint Water + Detergent

Tack Cloth

Medium Grit 3M™ Sanding Sponge

Fine Grit 3M™ Sanding Sponge

Purdy Paint Roller Cover for Smooth Surfaces


Paint Roller Frame

Purdy Paint Brush (2")

Premium Wall & Wood Primer

Instructions:

1. First, select your dresser. We recommend one with drawers that fully remove, and a dresser body that frames each drawer to maximize color contrast.
2. Remove the knobs and clean the dresser with warm water and detergent. Once it's dry, sand the dresser and clean off dust with tack cloth.
3. Select two alternating colors that would complement each other well. We picked Emerald® Interior Acrylic Latex Paint in Fountain SW 6787 and Redbud SW 6312.
4. Once colors are selected, remove all drawers and prime with Premium Wall & Wood primer. Let dry for 3-4 hours.
5. Once dry, paint two of the dresser drawers with the first color using a sponge or soft bristle brush. Slowly brush from the center of the face out to the edge.
6. Paint the other two dresser drawers using the second color using the same technique.
7. Once it's all completely dry, carefully replace the drawers into the dresser frame, and screw the knobs back on to finish the look.
